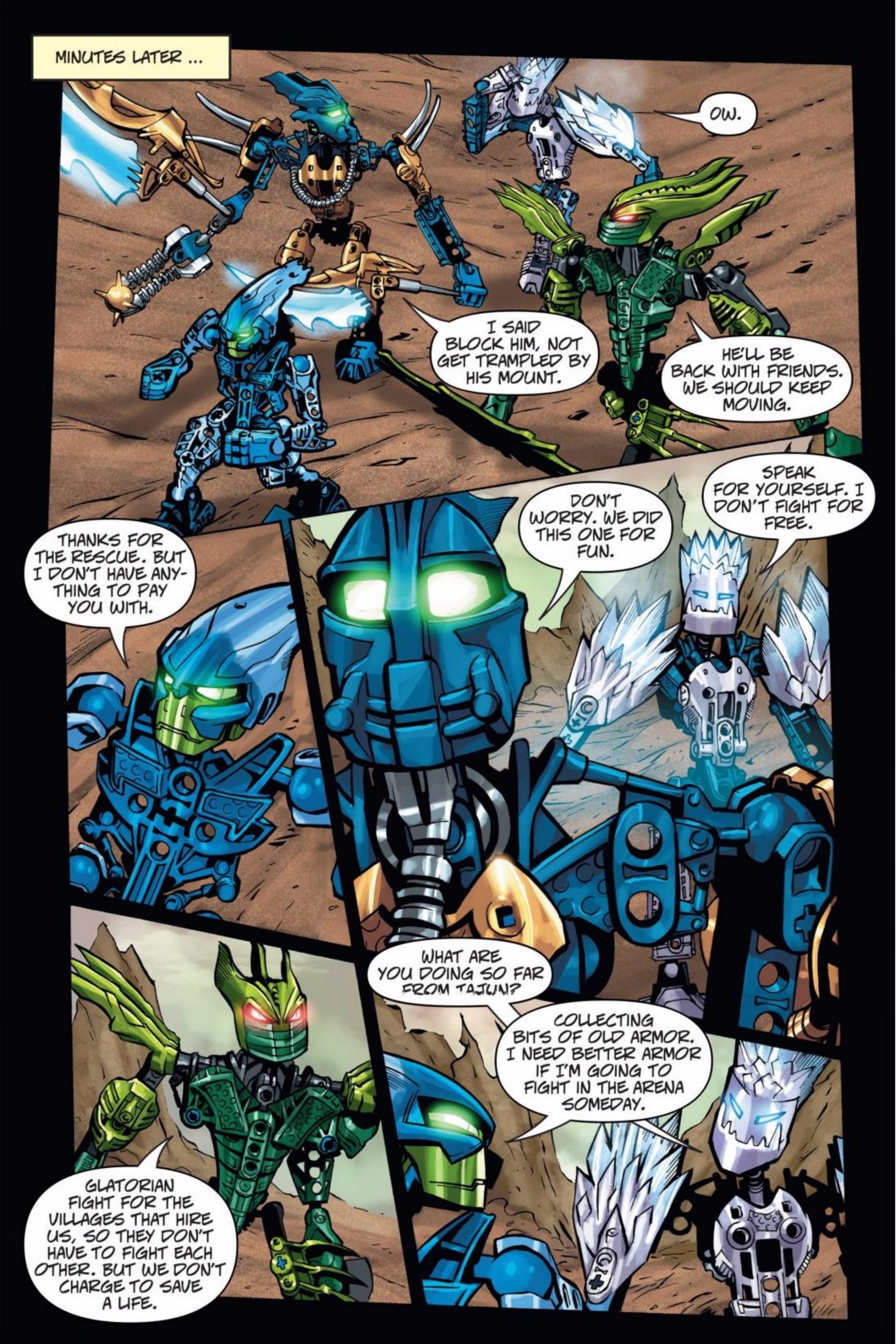
















#### WATCH OUT FOR PAPERCUTS

Welcome to BIONICLE #8, I'm your proud-as-can be Papercutz Editor-in-Chief Jim Salicrup. Well, we finally did it—an entire all-new BIONICLE graphic novel produced just for you! Now, we didn't just get anybody to write these new mini-epics. Oh, no—we went to the man who knows these characters and mind-blowing concepts better than anyone, the amazing Greg Farshtey!

Greg's been involved behind-the-scenes at LEGO since the very beginning of the BIONICLE concept, and not long ago he posted this insightful and informative piece on the early history of BIONICLE on the Papercutz.blog:

"BIONICLE got its start in 1999-2000, when an international team of people employed by the LEGO Company were tasked with coming up with a storyline-based LEGO line. The early working title was, believe it or not, 'Bone-Heads of Voodoo Island.' The first story bible (a summary of the year's story) for 2001 actually ended with Mata Nui awakening! No one could be sure if BIONICLE would be a big enough hit to last for more than one year ...

"The BIONICLE line was introduced with a comicbook, truck tours, a 'build your own website' contest, and, of course, the first six Toa canister sets. The six villager sets (who would later come to be called 'Matoran') were available only through a McDonald's promotion.

"As the Toa were originally planned, they were all different ages and they would all sound sort of 'godlike' when they spoke. I had a long conversation with story team head Bob Thompson as I worked on the first comic, and suggested that the characters might be easier to relate to if they had different personalities, and spoke differently from each other, rather than all sounding like Thor or Superman. He agreed, and that was how the initial characters were born in print."

### GREG FARSHTEY!

A PAPERCUTS Profile -

We emailed a bunch of questions to the brilliant brain behind the BIONICLE graphic novels, to better get to know this talented writer. Here are the fun-filled, insightful results...

#### **PAPERCUTZ:**

When and where were you born?

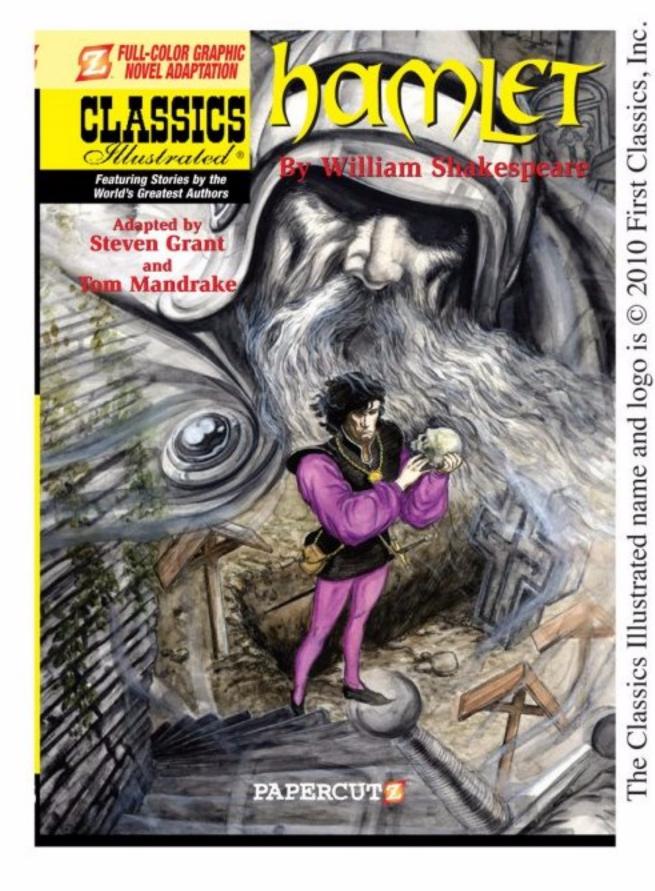
**GREG FARSHTEY**: I was born in 1965 in Mount Kisco, NY.

P: What were your favorite toys?

GREG: Mego action figures, and when I was older, LEGO bricks (LEGO bricks didn't come to the US until I was 9). I had a ton of action figures and used to make up stories with them that lasted for months

**P**: At what age did you start to read?

**GREG**: I was reading pretty young. I was reading



Shakespeare for fun when I was in first grade, I remember. Plus I learned a lot of vocabulary from comicbooks.

**P**: What did you read when you were a young boy?

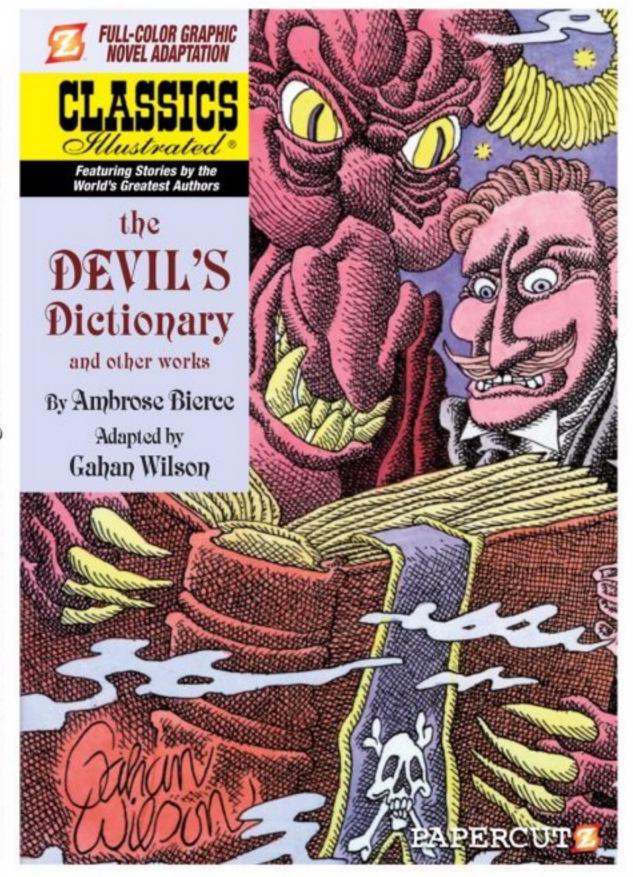
GREG: Comics, especially Batman, Encyclopedia Brown books. The Great Brain books, Sherlock Holmes, and history books.

P: When did you start to write?

**GREG**: I think the first writing I did was in fourth grade, but I didn't really get serious about it until high school.

**P**: Who were your favorite writers and artists?



GREG: My favorite writers are Ambrose Bierce, Jeffery Deaver, Raymond Chandler, and most recently, Christopher Fowler. I don't really have favorite artists, though I loved Gene Colan's comicbook work.

**P**: Did you take any special courses in school to become a writer?

GREG: No. I don't really believe you can teach someone to write. I think you can teach them to read, and to read things that will, in the long run, improve their writing. But I think a lot of writing is instinctive, you can do it or you can't.

**P**: What was your first published writing?

GREG: I self-published an underground paper in high school, and in college I had a short story published in a literary magazine. The first creative writing I was paid for was a humor column called Town Crier in the first paper I worked at.

**P**: How did you wind up working on BIONICLE?

GREG: I was hired at the LEGO Company in 2000 as the Club writer, to work on the LEGO Magazine. They were just getting ready to launch BIONICLE then. I knew they were going to do a comic, but figured I was too new to get to do it. I wrote a couple pages just for fun and showed them to my

boss. Turned out they needed the first script right away, so I got the chance to do it.

P: Why was the BIONICLE concept ever called "The Bone-Heads of Voodoo Island"?

GREG: Well, I wasn't working on the BIONICLE line at that time, but I suspect that was a combination of placeholder name and code name. Toy and game companies often use code names for projects, just in case the competition gets wind of what you're doing before you release. I once worked on a very, very serious science fiction game whose code name was "Dogs in Space."

P: Did you know when you started writing the BIONICLE stories how sprawling an epic it would become?

GREG: Not really. When I first started working on BIONICLE, the story was largely being dictated to me and I was just adapting it to comics. It really wasn't until the novels started that the universe started to expand.

P: How do you write a BIONICLE story-- what are your working methods?

**GREG**: Basically, I write it like I do any other fiction -- I let the characters do the heavy lifting. If you create a character the right way, he/she/it becomes like a real person in some ways -- you know what they do and don't like, what they would and wouldn't do, the same way you know that about a friend. Then it becomes easy to know how they would react in a given situation, how they would get along with others or not get along, what would anger them or frighten them. The trick is to not force your character to do something he wouldn't normally do, because at that moment, it becomes impossible to predict his actions and your story grinds to a halt.

P: Which story, in any of the books, comics, or DVDs is your favorite?

GREG: BIONICLE Adventures
10: Time Trap. It's the
"smallest" story I have written,
in that it really only focuses
on two characters, Makuta and

Vakama. It was also the story in which I rebooted Makuta and turned him from a supervillain who always lost to a really complex character who sometimes ALLOWED himself to lose to throw off his opponents

**P**: Do you have a favorite BIONICLE character?



GREG: Makuta Teridax and Kopaka. I also like a Dark Hunter named Lariska a lot and the Glatorian named Kiina.

**P**: Which is your favorite BIONICLE toy? And why?

**GREG**: I'm not sure I have a favorite set. I tend to like the bigger, more elaborate ones,

like the Skopio, because I like longer builds.

P: Do you have a favorite experience meeting BIONICLE fans?

GREG: Yes. I met a young boy named Evan back in 2003, who was a huge BIONICLE fan and had Asperger syndrome. I became close friends with him and his family and we exchanged birthday gifts for years. I am still friends with his Mom and have gotten to see him grow up in photos.

**P**: What's the best way for BIONICLE fans to contact you?

GREG: Most BIONICLE fans send me questions through a website called BZPower.com, where I am on under the screen name GregF. So that is probably the easiest way to get in touch.

P: Thanks so much, Greg! And keep up the great work!
